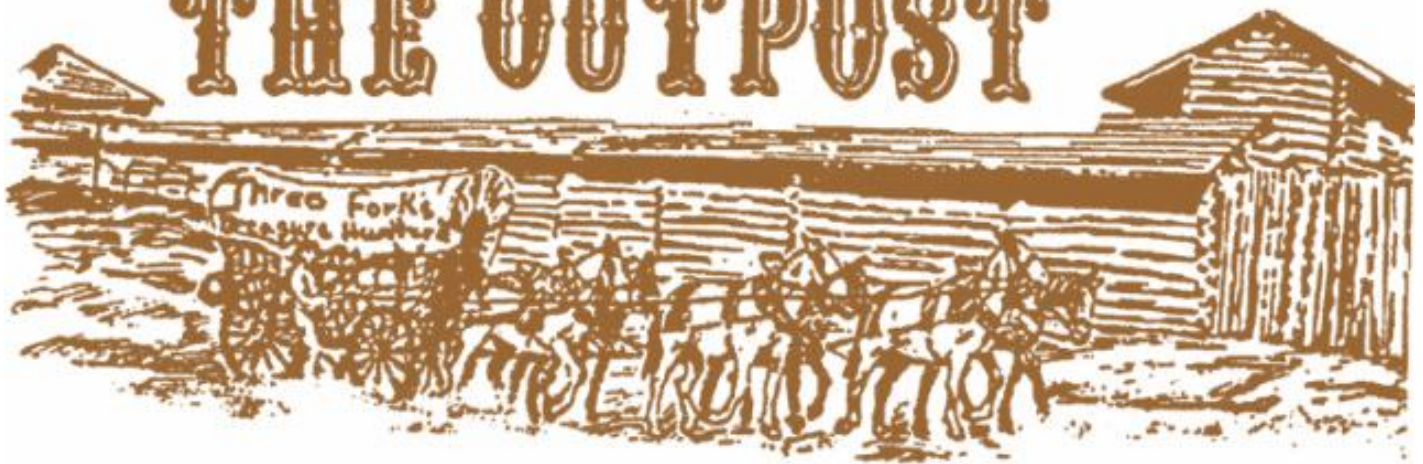

- Did not operate during the period 21 January 1853 to 13 December 1853. On 22 March 1872 the site of this office was moved 1½ miles south and name changed to New Boggy Depot. Located on Boggy Creek in what is not Atoka County. Boggy Depot was one of the most important of the early settlements. The first buildings were built in 1837, and within a few years Boggy Depot included churches, shops, a number of commercial buildings, and some very pretentious residences. The Choctaw National Council met there in 1859. During the Civil War the town was garrisoned continuously by Confederate troops. The brick church was used by them as a hospital, and for four years the Confederate flag flew from the flagpole of the town main street. A mile east of the town was located Capt. Charles LeFlore's toll bridge over Boggy River, and the main street of the town was the main Ft. Smith to Red River road. In 1871 the stage road took a new route, crossing Boggy River about three miles south of Captain LeFlore's bridge; and the town gradually moved south to the point where the new route joined the old road to Ft. Washita. The town has entirely disappeared, only the pre-war residence of Allen Wright, Principal Chief Choctaw Nation (1866-70), left standing.

Council appropriated \$5500 for the establishment of the Burney  
Female Academy. In 1858 an additional \$25,000 was appropriated for  
the project, and commissioners were appointed to confer with the  
Presbyterian Church, the body intended as the agency to operate the  
institution. Located a few miles from the present town of Lebanon,  
the buildings were completed and the school was ready to open in  
1859, but the Presbyterian Church failed to furnish the agreed  
superintendent. The Chickasaw Nation then announced it was ready  
to enter into a contract with anyone who would suitably conduct the  
school. That the institution ever opened its doors prior to the Civil  
War is very improbable.

Update – since I wrote this article in 2004 Garmin has newer versions of the Rino out with color screens and new features.

# Hi-Tech Relic Hunting Tools

Garmin has a line of GPS/Two Way Radios out. It is the Rino 110, 120, and 130. What is unique about them is not just the Walkie Talkie/GPS combo but the ability to send your position to other Rinos within range. Have you ever been hunting with a buddy that comes back with a bunch of goodies and says “you should have been there, I was yelling for you” or “I would have called you but I was so far away I couldn’t tell you how to get there”? With the Rino every time he calls you his position is updated on your map screen so you can see where he is and the tracks where he’s been. If you want you can navigate over to him. It also has a polling feature where you can find the positions of up to fifty Rino contacts. The Radios have 14 FRS channels with optional codes for privacy that you can transmit and receive up to two miles. They also have eight GRMS channels that have a five mile range. In order to use the GRMS channels you have to obtain a license from the FCC which costs \$75.00. The peer to peer position reporting only works on the FRS channels. They have voice activation and vibrates when you get an incoming call. The whole unit is waterproof. The Rino 120 and 130 comes loaded with a North American

base map that includes Interstate and State Highways along with exit information. You can also buy various Garmin Map Source CDs such as US Topo or Metro Guide to download more detailed maps. The Rino 120 can accept up to 8MBs and the 130 up to 24MBs of map details. The Rino 110

doesn’t have the base map but does have city points of interest and 1MB of memory to download more points of interests. The GPS is very easy to learn and use. They have a 12 channel GPS with the new WAAS system included. You can store up to 500 waypoints. To navigate to a contact or waypoint you just follow the bearing arrow on the compass for direction, The navigation page also shows you the distance, the estimated time in route, and your speed. Some of the other features are the Trip Computer; Satellite Screen; Calendar Page; Calculator; Alarm Clock; Stop Watch; Sun and Moon Page; Best Time to Hunting and Fishing Page; and Games. The Rino 130 has everything listed above plus a weather warning with seven supporting NOAA weather channels, a built in electronic compass, and a barometric altimeter. The GPS and Radio will run about 15 hours on two AA batteries. The lowest price I’ve found for the Rino 110 is about \$150.00 each, \$202.00 each for the 120, and \$279.00 each for the Rino 130. These are great for setting a waypoint at the truck, setting waypoints at spots you find, finding your hunting buddies, your hunting buddies finding you, and for safety.

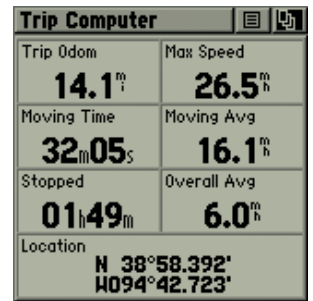

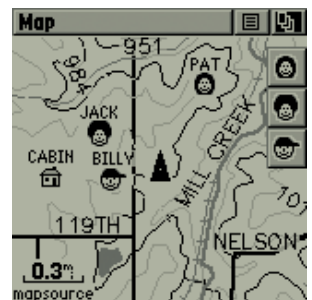
